This past year, thousands of children were supported to continue their education and return to school. 176 teachers learnt how to create inclusive learning spaces. New classrooms, handwashing stations, and latrines are also helping children learn in sanitary environments.

Girls are gaining confidence through playing sports and can now make informed decisions about their lives and bodies. And more than 4,800 people are now aware of children's rights and child protection, helping to keep girls and boys safe in their communities.

CASE STORY: YOUNG MOTHER, BRIGHT FUTURE

"When I started to participate in the Plan for Girls project activities, I started to feel confident that I can succeed. And that's what convinced me to go back to school."

Meet Patricia

Like your sponsored child, Patricia has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Patricia is among the top students in her class—she's also one of the oldest. When she got pregnant four years ago, she had to drop out of school. But after joining the Girls' Advisory Committee, she regained her confidence and is dreaming of a brighter future.

Empowering Girls

A lack of sexual and reproductive health education often leads to early pregnancies. Many girls, like Patricia, are shamed by their parents—without family support, they struggle to care for their new babies while continuing their education. In most cases, girls never return to school.

In Patricia's village, the Plan for Girls project is working to support girls and young women to take charge of their lives and bodies. By learning more about their rights, gender equality, and sexual health, girls gain the confidence they need to open the door to a brighter future.

Through taking part in community events, Patricia realised she could still achieve her dreams and returned to school.

Supportive Families

Patricia gained new skills and knowledge–and so did her parents. During activities for parents, Patricia's father became supportive of her returning home and continuing her education.

With this support, Patricia is able to focus on her studies and overcome the perception that a young mother cannot do well at school.

She is proud of her accomplishments and is excited to take on her next challenge of completing technical courses so she can get a good job and support her young child.

OUR PROJECTS IN NATITINGOU ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



Young people are learning about their rights and their bodies so they can make informed decisions about their lives

REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH



Young people in Natitingou do not have access to sexual and reproductive health education. Rates of early pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections continue to be high, leaving youth unable to reach their full potential.

The Champions of Change project is helping empower young people with the knowledge they need to take charge of their lives. 1,522 girls and 1,417 boys took part in workshops to learn more about their rights and bodies. They have gained confidence and can now advocate for gender equality in their communities.

Young people also joined media clubs, where they created 24 radio programmes. These broadcasts are now reaching others with messages on sexual health, girls' rights, and how to prevent gender-based violence.

THE POWER OF SPORT

Early marriage is common in Natitingou, and many girls end up dropping out of school. Negative gender norms encourage girls to focus on domestic work, leaving girls without the opportunity to reach their full potential.

Through the power of sport, girls and boys are learning about their rights and gender equality and gaining the confidence to make changes in their communities. 60 girls' sports associations have now been created, with 1,800 children taking part.

These sports groups are now fully equipped with the equipment they need for practice and competitions. 120 leaders also completed training on children's rights, equality for girls, and protection against gender-based violence.

"I love football, but it was unusual for a girl. Thanks to Plan International, I now play with others, and I'm more confident. I believe this can give me the chance to become a lawyer. I am not ashamed to play anymore, and I am not afraid of boys."
