Potosí Cochabamba comprises six municipalities in Bolivia. This year, we created 8 organisations to support and empower young women entrepreneurs. In addition to fostering collaboration between the women and institutions, we trained young people in business skills like management and budget planning.

650 teenagers took on the role of youth leaders and will pass on knowledge about sexual health and reproductive rights to their peers. This includes providing menstrual hygiene supplies to 2,000 young girls.

Meet Belén

Like your sponsored child, Belén has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Belén lives in San Pablo de Guarayos, a community six hours outside of Santa Cruz. Growing up in a family of musicians, Belén fostered a love of volleyball, and dreams of studying medicine.

Improving Measures for Safety

Belén's mother is a strong force in their community, and a role model to her teen daughter. Watching her mother speak to groups, Belén learned valuable lessons about confidence and leadership.

This year, Plan International selected Belén to be in charge of their Way Home programme, which focuses on protecting communities from crimes against women, particularly human trafficking. Belén now meets with other women leaders from her community to discuss the dangers they face and to brainstorm prevention.

In Bolivia, human trafficking is a significant issue. From January 2019 to June 2021, the country had 3,541 reported cases of human trafficking and smuggling.

Girls Become Leaders

Through Belén's work with Plan's Way Home project, she has become more passionate than ever about using the tools of education and prevention to protect girls and women in San Pablo de Guarayos.

Belén's role in the Way Home project allows her to build agency, confidence and self-esteem through a position of leadership that fosters deeper conversations about safety for girls and women between community members of all ages. The women leaders of the Way Home project strive toward creating a city in which "no woman is a victim.

OUR PROJECTS IN POTOSÍ COCHABAMBA ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



PROMOTING STRONG GIRLS



Girls participated with local networks to develop new senses of confidence and agency.

Our Folife programme is intended to support a budding generation of feminist leaders.

This year, we collaborated with Potosí Cochabamba's Youth Network and Muncipal Network Against Violence to offer a camp, workshops and dialogue spaces for young women to meet, learn and share ideas.

Our participating learners received workshops in vital topics like sexual and reproductive rights, violence prevention, economic empowerment and leadership. We also offered practical skills trainings to girls, like digital technology and digital safety.

"We worked with community members of all ages to redefine equality, safety, and resilience for Potosí Cochabamba."





Our PAPAI project strengthens the bond between fathers and their children. Through educating young children and their parents on safety, communication, and connection, we are breaking down a deep-set of intergenerational violence.

This year, we offered 92 sessions in 92 communities across Potosi Cochabamba for parents and children under 9 years old. This included both 305 sponsored and 1,840 unsponsored children.

Meanwhile, 108 parents took part in our Active Paternity Fairs, spread across 18 clubs throughout Potosí Cochabamba. 14 primary schools and 11 primary and secondary combined schools were given greater play equipment to create fun, safe spaces for children and parents to play together.



"Plan's paternity notebook taught me how to be in the family, how to live with my wife and kids, how to listen to my children, how they have to listen to me. It's not like before. Now we have to work as a family."
