This year, our main projects in Sucre focused on active parenting in early childhood, sexual health and reproductive rights, gender equality and nonviolence. Our projects called PAPAI and ARRIBA taught hundreds of community members of all ages about safety, empowerment, communication and agency.

550 mothers and 650 fathers in Sucre learned about active parenting and positive discipline. 28 communities benefitted directly from local projects, and 15 motivated young people will bring lessons of gender equality to their schools.

Meet Belén

Like your sponsored child, Belén has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Belén lives in San Pablo de Guarayos, a community six hours outside of Santa Cruz. Growing up in a family of musicians, Belén fostered a love of volleyball, and dreams of studying medicine.

Improving Measures for Safety

Belén's mother is a strong force in their community, and a role model to her teen daughter. Watching her mother speak to groups, Belén learned valuable lessons about confidence and leadership.

This year, Plan International selected Belén to be in charge of their Way Home programme, which focuses on protecting communities from crimes against women, particularly human trafficking. Belén now meets with other women leaders from her community to discuss the dangers they face and to brainstorm prevention.

In Bolivia, human trafficking is a significant issue. From January 2019 to June 2021, the country had 3,541 reported cases of human trafficking and smuggling.

Girls Become Leaders

Through Belén's work with Plan's Way Home project, she has become more passionate than ever about using the tools of education and prevention to protect girls and women in San Pablo de Guarayos.

Belén's role in the Way Home project allows her to build agency, confidence and self-esteem through generative actions: a position of leadership that fosters deeper conversations about safety for girls and women between community members of all ages. The women leaders of the Way Home project strive toward creating a city in which "no woman is a victim."

SUPPORTING AN INCLUSIVE EDUCATION




Replacing machismo with agents of change. Toxic masculinity impacts both young men and women. Our ARRIBA programme challenges patriarchal machismo in Sucre and proposes healthier alternatives.

Since February 2018, the ARRIBA project has been actively engaged in Sucre to fight against gender inequality, promote positive masculinity and educate young people about sexual and reproductive rights.

This year, 650 teenagers trained with ARRIBA to become mentors and role models to their peers. They will educate 2,000 fellow students about sex education, gender roles, menstruation, leadership and advocacy.

Education took many forms this year in Sucre, from peer-to-peer sexual education workshops to dynamic drawing activities about safety for young children.





This year, 207 sponsored and 527 unsponsored children under the age of 9 were supported with 59 workshop sessions, which used tools like drawing to deal with themes of gender, violence and self-protection. An additional 105 sponsored and 250 unsponsored children aged 10-18 benefitted from their own tailored sessions.

8 parent clubs collaborated to host Active Paternity fairs, which reached 87 parents. An additional 1,200 local parents will be impacted by their children's workshops.
