




YOUR ANNUAL UPDATE

Thanks to your sponsorship, children and families are making positive changes in Río Seco. Learn more about the valuable ways your support has benefitted them.

This year, we focused on protecting children from violence, preventing teen pregnancy and empowering young women to become financially solvent. 30 women and youth-led organisations have received seed funding from Plan to pursue entrepreneurial projects.

Simultaneously, we provided resources at 6 schools for students with special needs. 809 young participants belonging to 26 youth networks were reached by Plan projects, as well as thousands of additional teens who learned about sexual health and reproductive rights.

Meet Belén

Like your sponsored child, Belén has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Belén lives in San Pablo de Guarayos, a community six hours outside of Santa Cruz. Growing up in a family of musicians, Belén fostered a love of volleyball, and dreams of studying medicine.

Improving Measures for Safety

Belén's mother is a strong force in their community, and a role model to her teen daughter. Watching her mother speak to groups, Belén learned valuable lessons about confidence and leadership.

This year, Plan International selected Belén to be in charge of their Way Home programme, which focuses on protecting communities from crimes against women, particularly human trafficking. Belén now meets with other women leaders from her community to discuss the dangers they face and to brainstorm prevention.

In Bolivia, human trafficking is a significant issue. From January 2019 to June 2021, the country had 3,541 reported cases of human trafficking and smuggling.

Girls Become Leaders

Through Belén's work with Plan's Way Home project, she has become more passionate than ever about using the tools of education and prevention to protect girls and women in San Pablo de Guarayos.

Belén's role in the Way Home project allows her to build agency, confidence and selfesteem through a position of leadership that fosters deeper conversations about safety for girls and women between community members of all ages. The women leaders of the Way Home project strive toward creating a city in which "no woman is a victim."

OUR PROJECTS IN RÍO SECO ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



From football to sexual education, this year's projects in Río Seco encouraged girls to feel powerful.

RAISING THEM WITH CARE



The pandemic has caused an increase in teen pregnancies and violence. In 2021, Bolivia's Attorney General registered 8,133 cases of violence against women, children and teenagers.

This year, Plan International fostered more than 211 in-person workshops dedicated to preventing gender-based violence and teen pregnancy. As a result of these workshops, 2,099 caregivers have learned about protecting their children from these dangers.

2,348 teenagers took part in lessons about contraception and safer sex, while 180 community leaders received training on sexual and reproductive rights. 11 health centres received equipment for adolescent care, which included the donation of 1 septic tank in the Chijipina Grande Health Centre.



EMPOWERING GIRLS THROUGH SPORT



We are fighting deeply-rooted inequalities through football. Via a partnership with UEFA (the European Football Association), Plan International is offering extracurricular football to boys and girls in Río Seco.

This year, 327 teenagers participated in social football workshops and games. By demonstrating their prowess on the field, girls challenged existing stereotypes about women in sports and found a new sense of agency.

Their lessons were bolstered by the support of 41 teachers and municipal authorities who used an approach of violence prevention and gender equity to encourage students to learn more about rights and gender-based violence. 15 participating educational units were provided with football equipment, including balls, whistles and first-aid kits.
