Thanks to your sponsorship, children and families are making positive changes in Namentenga. Learn more about the valuable ways your support has benefitted them.

Rural Namentenga is located in Burkina Faso's Centre-Nord region. Vulnerable to both ongoing political violence and the effects of climate change, children in the region are at a high risk of dropping out of school, living in poverty and/or experiencing gender-based violence.

This year, 30,247 Namentenga residents received necessary funds. 3,133 children and 1,958 pregnant women benefitted from three months of food rations, while 55 girls received scholarships to stay in school.

Meet Zonabo

Like your sponsored child, Zonabo has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Since 2016, Burkina Faso has been overwhelmed by a violent political crisis. The unpredictable danger has forced more than 1.7 million families, including Zonabo's, to flee their homes.

Safer Together

16-year-old Zonabo and her family escaped political turmoil four years ago. At that time, she had already dropped out of school. Having left behind the land they knew how to cultivate, Zonabo's family – like many displaced families – struggled to make ends meet. Through Plan International, Zonabo participated in a training on entrepreneurship, a vocational course that has now reached 1,500 displaced people in Burkina Faso.

Plan provided Zonabo with unconditional cash support, which she used to start her business. In total, 1,734 sponsored children – including Zonabo – have received financial and emotional support from Plan's programmes for displaced people. Through Plan's workshops, long-time locals and their new displaced neighbours are learning to build peaceful communities.

You Can Count On Me

Initially, Zonabo used her seed funding from Plan to sell mangoes. Then, she went on to selling condiments, which she still does today. Zonabo also helps her mother – another graduate of Plan's vocational training course – to prepare cakes and oil.

Zonabo has become a role model to other girls in her new community. She is proud and confident to be able to contribute to her family. With this new financial freedom, Zonabo helps her loved ones build a safer, stronger life in a village free from violence.

OUR PROJECTS IN NAMENTENGA ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



PROVIDING INCLUSIVE EDUCATION



Just 29% of girls in Burkina Faso are enrolled in secondary school. From the risk of gender-based violence to a lack of adequate menstrual hygiene facilities, girls face an uphill battle in completing their education. A low level of education in youth raises a person's risks in adulthood.

This year, 1,791 community members of all ages participated in sensitisation trainings about menstruation, while 85 students learned to make reusable sanitary napkins. These lessons are a vital step in keeping girls in school who often stay home during their periods and are likelier to fail their courses due to such absences.

55 at-risk and high-achieving girls received scholarships to stay in school. 16 educators were trained on protecting children from gender-based violence, and 6 children's organisations about menstrual health received funding.

From breaking down menstruation stigma to creating safe spaces to discuss finance, girls and women in Namentenga have new systems of support in their communities.

SKILLS TO SUCCEED



80% of women enrolled in savings groups report their incomes rising above the poverty line. Since Plan began working in Namentenga in 1978, 1,650 savings groups have formed in the community. This year, that number is still rising.

Between July 2021 and September 2022, 59 new savings and loans groups formed for local women. In total, 31,932 women in Namentenga participated in these circles, which discussed entrepreneurship as well as COVID-19 and education for girls.

As part of an effort to build income generating activities, 23 young women and 2 young men participated in trainings on sheep fattening, while 10 young people received poultry vaccination kits. 15 women were trained in hairdressing.
