Thanks to your sponsorship, children and families are making positive changes in Stung Treng. Learn more about the valuable ways your support has benefitted.

In the last year, children, parents, and teachers developed emergency plans to keep themselves safe in the event of a natural disaster.

285 students led campaigns in their communities on the importance of good hygiene, and 334 families now have new household latrines.

Girls and boys gained the confidence they need to challenge gender roles and advocate for equality. And hundreds of youths can now take charge of their bodies and futures after gaining sexual and reproductive health knowledge.

#### **Meet Karry**

Like your sponsored child, Karry has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Karry is completing grade 11 at a high school away from home – breaking barriers and forging a path for other girls every day. With skills from attending Girls Lead workshops, Karry now has the confidence to speak up for her rights and advocate for equality. And she has big dreams for her future.

#### **Challenging Gender Roles**

In Karry's rural community, girls are often prevented from playing active roles in public spaces.

Joining social clubs is not encouraged, and parents often keep their daughters at home to help with household chores. Early marriage is still common, and education for girls is not highly valued.

Karry used to follow these gender roles, until she joined Plan International's project on girls' rights. Along with other girls, she learned about gender equality and the importance of finishing her education before getting married.

#### **Dreaming of a Bright Future**

The Girls Lead programme helped Karry gain confidence in public speaking and she is embracing leadership roles in her community.

In March, she took over the role of foreign ambassador for a day. Her dream for the future is to become president so she can continue to challenge gender roles and advocate for the rights of girls.

Karry has the support of her parents to reach her full potential. Many parents took part in the Girls Lead programme, and they are now committed to girls' education and gender equality, which will help more girls like Karry.

# **OUR PROJECTS IN STUNG TRENG ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE**



204 girls and 126 boys joined youth clubs and learned about their rights

# **GIRLS LEAD**



Negative gender stereotypes about girls' abilities undermines their self-esteem and confidence. Girls in Stung Treng are taught at an early age not to speak out and express their opinions. Many people believe that household chores are the responsibility of girls.

To empower girls to stand up for their rights, Plan has helped facilitate training sessions for 330 children and youth. By sharing personal stories on how gender roles affect them, girls and boys learned about gender equality and gained confidence in public speaking. Young people can now challenge cultural norms and advocate for change at home, in school, and in society.

More than 100 parents participated in events to improve their knowledge on girls' rights and gender equality. Parents now also feel confident in advocating for and practicing equality in their daily lives.



## **PROMOTING SAFE SCHOOLS**



Around 30% of primary schools in Stung Treng are considered unsafe. In the remote and river-filled region, seasonal flooding often makes it unsafe for children to travel to school. A lack of knowledge on responding to disasters also leaves children and families at risk during storms.

With Plan's support, school management committees at 60 schools have now developed disaster risk reduction plans to improve student safety. 73 girls and 83 boys took part in storm simulation drills to enhance their capacity to respond and keep themselves and their peers safe.

And another 15 schools have created emergency in education plans, so children can continue learning even during natural disasters.

"I learned how to identify the risks and I can respond myself to the risks – for example, when I play in the school playground, I can protect myself from falling tree branches, or when there is a storm, flooding, or severe rains, I can find safe places to stay." - Chalika (10) from Stung Treng
