Plan International has been collaborating with the people of San Juan, Dominican Republic since 1995. During this time, Plan has worked with the people of San Juan to implement disaster resilience strategies, with an eye toward nutrition, livelihood, and gender inclusivity.

This year, representatives from 11 community groups received trainings in critical topics like Gender Equality and Prevention of Child Abuse. 30 young people received vocational training, and 800 students will be reached by peer workshops on positive masculinity.

Meet Manuela

Like your sponsored child, Manuela has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Manuela is a hardworking student living in San Juan. Learning isn't exactly accessible in San Juan, what with limited school resources and school closures. Plan International has ideas for a solution.

I Will Stay in School

Manuela is currently in Grade 8. She lives with her grandmother, her two sisters, and her father. Since Manuela's mother was diagnosed with cancer, she has had to move to another village for treatment.

Manuela's teachers describe her as a smart, dedicated learner. However, schools in San Juan are faced with an uphill battle. With limited space to address topics outside of the school curriculum – and limited space literally – young students in low-income areas like Manuela's don't have room to talk about their rights or struggles, or to participate in sports. Students across the Dominican Republic have fallen behind as the pandemic closed schools. Without access to remote learning, many young learners are losing step with their grade levels in reading, writing and mathematics.

Strong Schools for Strong Students

Plan International's Children's Club creates nurturing spaces for young minds. Through her Children's Club, Manuela participates in GONNA, a guidance group for children and adolescents.

This year, Manuela and her classmates learned about human rights and gender equality. Plan donated supplies for volleyball and chess, as well as more than 200 books. Since participating in GONNA, Manuela's grades have improved. She has gone from being a shy student to a confident leader.

WE CURRENTLY WORK WITH 7,298 CHILDREN IN SAN JUAN

OUR PROJECTS IN SAN JUAN ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



From judgement-free, responsibility-building workshops to hands-on vocational training, young people in San Juan are building stronger communities for tomorrow.

SKILLS TO SUCCEED



23% of young women are unemployed, while employed women earn 24% less than men. This year, Plan International collaborated with young people in San Juan to combat gender inequality and encourage financial growth at the same time.

30 young people received vocational skills and workshops. These lessons, developed in partnership with the Professional Technical Training Institute (INFOTEP), focused on small business entrepreneurship, network management, and tourism.

Plan International also collaborated with 2 local ecotourism companies, strengthening their business plans and marketing strategies to improve their annual income. As a result, close to 400 visitors have explored San Juan with the support of our two new partners.

An additional 80 visitors planted more than 2,000 trees as part of one tour group's offerings.

YOUNG MEN FOR EQUALITY





Fighting systemic sexism is a community-wide project. Plan International's "Young Men for Equality" sets out to dismantle gender-based violence through workshops with children, adolescents, and young adults.

These lessons, which are geared specifically toward boys and young men, have units like "I am a supportive young man", "I am responsible in the exercise of my sexuality", and "I am committed to good treatment and gender equality."

This year, 90 young men between ages 13 and 17 participated in these workshops, with the intention of passing along these lessons as peer mentors. As a result, an additional 800 young people will be impacted by these sessions.
