Let's not be overcome by our problems, let's face it because we are strong, and with our heads held high, let's fulfil our goals and dreams. Thanks to Plan's support, girls can see their present and future in a different way. I want to study medicine and become a doctor, and I'm sure I will.

Meet Dayana

Like your sponsored child, Dayana has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Before her participation in the leadership school, Dayana was shy and reserved. She was afraid to express herself in public, and she wasn't confident talking with her family about issues she was curious about.

Facing Gender Challenges

Now Dayana is attending her last year of secondary education, after which she will go to university and study for the future she always wanted—to be a doctor. Dayana is the fourth of five siblings growing up in the Ecuadorian highlands, surrounded by high mountains and a river where her family caught fish.

The COVID-19 pandemic severely impacted her family, who found themselves lacking money and food. In her family, there are more men than women, which meant Dayana was responsible for domestic responsibilities, such as caring for her younger brother as well as the animals.

Unlike her brothers, Dayana wasn't able to participate in social, cultural and sporting events, and had little time to play.

Encouraged to Participate

With Plan's support, Dayana learned about her rights—and discovered her dream of becoming a doctor. Along with 43 friends, she took workshops on gender equality, selfesteem, communication, sexuality and leadership. Today, Dayana is confident and secure. She has her family's support and her priorities for her future are clear. Even better, she's encouraging other girls to pursue their dreams. Recently, Dayana participated in a TV interview to promote girls' rights and commemorate International Women's Day. With her newfound leadership abilities and confidence, Dayana—and girls like her—are changing the world and their places in it.

OUR PROJECTS IN LOJA ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



IMPROVING SEXUAL HEALTH



Sexual violence and early pregnancy have a profound impact on the health and future of young people, especially girls. In 2019, more than 51,000 adolescent mothers gave birth in Ecuador, nearly 2,000 of whom were under 14.

Education, resources and youth involvement are key to change. Participants of the "Free Zone of Teenage Pregnancy" programme used learning spaces to host meetings, forums and events to discuss about gender rights and health. In coordination with families and community leaders, the programme promoted access to sexual and reproductive health services. It empowered families with the tools and resources to provide their daughters and sons with clear, healthy sexual education through effective parenting practices.

As a result, adolescent pregnancy has been reduced by 70% in the project areas, giving girls access to a healthier future.

Over 800 adolescent girls and boys participated in youth clubs in 10 communities, where they learned about sexual health and gender rights.





Due to poverty and unemployment, many families struggle to provide their children with healthy, nutritious food. In fact, 25% of children in Loja are malnourished.

We partnered with communities to supply 180 kits for raising small animals and establishing family gardens, helping approximately 900 children to access healthy food, and empowering parents to improve their families' nutrition.

Positive parenting workshops raised awareness of children's health for 187 families. They also learned about the importance of supporting women in decision-making roles. In addition, 32 fathers took part in the "Caring Dads" project, promoting the importance of men's participation in the home, including daily care, and nutrition.
