Meet Dayana

Like your sponsored child, Dayana has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Before her participation in the leadership school, Dayana was shy and reserved. She was afraid to express herself in public, and she wasn't confident talking with her family about issues she was curious about.

Facing Gender Challenges

Now Dayana is attending her last year of secondary education, after which she will go to university and study for the future she always wanted—to be a doctor. Dayana is the fourth of five siblings growing up in the Ecuadorian highlands, surrounded by high mountains and a river where her family caught fish.

The COVID-19 pandemic severely impacted her family, who found themselves lacking money and food. In her family, there are more men than women, which meant Dayana was responsible for domestic responsibilities, such as caring for her younger brother as well as the animals.

Unlike her brothers, Dayana wasn't able to participate in social, cultural and sporting events, and had little time to play.

Encouraged to Participate

With Plan's support, Dayana learned about her rights—and discovered her dream of becoming a doctor. Along with 43 friends, she took workshops on gender equality, selfesteem, communication, sexuality and leadership. Today, Dayana is confident and secure. She has her family's support and her priorities for her future are clear. Even better, she's encouraging other girls to pursue their dreams. Recently, Dayana participated in a TV interview to promote girls' rights and commemorate International Women's Day. With her newfound leadership abilities and confidence, Dayana—and girls like her—are changing the world and their places in it.

OUR PROJECTS IN GUAYAS LOS RIOS ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



EMPLOYMENT SKILLS TO SUCCEED



In Ecuador, unemployment rates for women are more than double that of men. Although entrepreneurship rates are similar between young women and men, a higher proportion of women are motivated by need. Empowering women, with economic autonomy, is vital.

With training sessions and cooperation from the community Technical Business University, young people could gain information and resources to create their own small businesses and develop employment opportunities. Ten people accessed university scholarships, studying finance, tourism, foreign trade, and marketing. In addition, 14 young people sharpened their accounting skills and learned how to obtain business IDs.

Small businesses were supported with the tools and resources to grow, and a Social Enterprise was formalised by 10 women volunteers, generating job opportunities.

Empowering women economically is key to addressing employment inequality. In Guayas Los Rios, 17 young women were awarded seed capital to promote their businesses.



SEXUAL & REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS



Girls and women in Guayas Los Rios experience high levels of early pregnancy. In fact, in the last 10 years, the amount of adolescent mothers between the ages of 10 and 14 has significantly increased.

Knowledge and communication are key to addressing this issue. Many young people lack reliable, accurate information about sexual and reproductive health and rights. By participating in informational workshops and meetings, youth, parents and community leaders learned how to reduce early pregnancy and address gender violence and discrimination. Families improved communication around gender and sexuality, and parents talk more openly with their children. In addition to learning about sexuality and rights, young people gained self-esteem, and developed life projects with clear and specific goals for their futures.
