CASE STORY: STAYING IN SCHOOL



NAME: WUDNESH AGE: 16 YEARS OLD HOBBY: WATCHING TV

"We used to suffer during menstruation. It was common to use pieces of cloth. However, with the support of Plan International, we began using reusable sanitary pads. And with the new menstrual hygiene room, we are now properly managing our periods at school."

Meet Wudnesh

Like your sponsored child, Wudnesh has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Wudnesh is completing grade 8 at school, and is among the top of her class. She's taking charge of her future by taking charge of her body, and is no longer missing out on her lessons because of her period.

Improved Schools, Brighter Futures

A lack of classrooms at Wudnesh's school meant many students crowded into rooms without enough desks and chairs. Girls and boys also shared the same toilets, which left little privacy or dignity for girls to manage their periods while at school.

Plan International constructed three fullyfurnished school blocks. Principals and teachers also took part in training on school management, helping to improve conditions for children like Wudnesh.

And new gender-friendly latrines, including a menstrual hygiene management room, has ensured girls have safe spaces.

Safe and Sanitary

Wudnesh's school also received reusable sanitary pads for students. And new sewing machines are giving girls the skills they need to make more sanitary pads.

To go with the latrines, clean water and handwashing stations were also installed. A water, sanitation and hygiene club is helping students learn more about the importance of handwashing with soap to stay healthy.

Girls like Wudnesh can now safely and hygienically manage their menstruation and stay in school, helping them open the door to a brighter future.

OUR PROJECTS IN ADDIS ABABA NAME ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



Young children in Addis Ababa can now learn and play in safe and inclusive pre-schools

HEALTHY BEGINNINGS



Less than half of young children in Ethiopia are enrolled in pre-school. Early education is crucial for children to develop a strong foundation of social, emotional, and physical skills so they can thrive.

Through community outreach, 165 young children are now attending early childhood education centres. And 210 new chairs at the pre-school is ensuring all children who attend can comfortably learn and play with their peers. New toilet facilities, including gender-friendly and disability-friendly toilets, is also making schools more inclusive spaces.

To ensure young children can grow up healthy and strong, 184 malnourished girls and boys received nutrition supports. And with training on growing vegetables and raising poultry, families are better able to provide nutritious foods to their children. Direct access to safe water at 17 households is also reducing the risk of water-borne diseases.

SAFER CITIES



Around one in four women have experienced physical violence on public transport in Addis Ababa. Fear of harm, coupled with restrictive gender norms, prevents girls and women from playing an active role in their communities.

To help girls and women feel safer in public, 15 new solar street lights have been installed in critical areas. And 239 young people took part in training on social accountability, so they can collaborate with local authorities on improving services. 400 community members also learned more about gender equality, social cohesion, and violence prevention.

A further 200 youth improved their knowledge on their economic rights and safe work conditions. Seven youth business groups also received training and financial support, helping to strengthen their businesses.



"We had a poultry business, but lost our chickens due to a lack of supplies. During this time, we took part in the business skills training organised by Plan; we received start-up capital to buy more chickens. This saved our business, and improved our family's well-being."
