Thanks to your sponsorship, children and families are making positive changes in Northern Ghana. Learn more about the valuable ways your support has benefitted them.

Plan International has been working in Northern Ghana since 2002. During that time, and with your help, health care services have dramatically improved for mothers: post-natal care has increased from 38% to 84%, while skilled birth attendance has increased from 48% to 60%.

Teen pregnancy also continues to decline, decreasing from 14% to 12% in just two years. 72,513 residents of Northern Ghana benefitted from savings groups, which train residents in financial literacy, employability, and entrepreneurship.

"When I joined Plan's skills training, I wanted to see whether I was capable of making shoes as a woman because, all my life, I have never seen a woman in shoe production; all I saw was men. I am proud of myself. I feel empowered to take this further and confident to practise at home."

Meet Shine

Like your sponsored child, Shine has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. 18-year-old Shine lives on a compound in Ghana with her family of seven and two other families. Though she graduated from secondary school, her grades put her future plans into question.

Knowledge Is Power

Shine watched her former classmates continue their studies in faraway communities while she stayed at home.

Shine's parents, a petty trader and a peasant farmer, enlisted their eldest and only daughter in an apprenticeship as a dressmaker. After a month, Shine resigned from her study: It just wasn't right for her.

Once a year, Plan International offers skills training sessions to sponsored youth in Ghana. There, in a session on making footwear, Shine began to feel like she was finding her path. Plan supported Shine – the only girl pursuing shoemaking – by connecting her with a local business where she could apprentice.

Finding My Way

After Shine's initial lessons in shoemaking, Plan provided her with basic tools to continue pursuing her newfound trade. Plan also facilitated Shine's enrolment in a certification course on shoemaking.

With her new abilities, Shine has become financially independent from her parents. Soon, she will join one of Plan's Village Savings and Loans groups, where she hopes to use her funds to open her own shoe business. Today, she makes shoes for men and children, but tomorrow, the sky's the limit. "This was a big step for me," says Shine.

OUR PROJECTS IN NORTHERN GHANA ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



From discussions about positive masculinity to institutional funding, girls and women in Northern Ghana are receiving support from the ground up.





91% of women in Ghana are working in informal, unregulated sectors. These precarious working conditions both expose women to dangers on the job and perpetuate inequalities at home. Women often find themselves unable to pursue their own enterprises and feel disempowered.

Plan International's Savings Groups function as safe spaces for women to discuss finance and learn about important topics, from gender equality to children's rights. This year, 10,647 savings groups members in Northern Ghana supported one another in finding financial freedom.

299 men in the community participated in workshops on positive masculinity. 133 religious leaders discussed gender equality and the economic empowerment of women. 13 local women's rights groups were trained in advocating for businesswomen in Northern Ghana.

YOU CAN COUNT ON ME



72 local women's rights organisations received significant funding. Plan's Women's Voice and Leadership project aims to support underfunded grassroots organisations to better support girls and women in their communities.

This year, 72 organisations received a total of 83 grants to continue their work in political advocacy and collective action. 46 survivors of sexual and gender-based violence received legal services. 25 women's rights organisations received valuable training in nationwide activism.

25 staff members from 21 different women's rights organisations participated in media training workshops in an effort to better spread the message about gender equity in Northern Ghana.
