This past year, families who lost their homes during the 2020 hurricanes Eta and lota were able to move into newly built houses and establish home gardens.

Also, this year 15 girls from different parts of Santa Barbara participated in the virtual platform Girls Out Loud. These young leaders are attending their first regional meeting, where they will discuss organisation and feminism. In addition, over 500 high school students participated in two health and education fairs, where they received information on sexual and reproductive rights and menstrual health management.

CASE STORY: DARLIN SPEAKS HER MIND



NAME: DARLIN AGE: 18 Hobby: Reading, Studying Spanish

"We became participative young women; with a different perspective towards a distant but not difficult future. We have learned many things about our rights, how to help others if they suffer some kind of violence, identify types of violence, talk about our self-esteem, among other topics."

Meet Darlin

Like your sponsored child, Darlin has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Darlin is the oldest girl in her family, and lives with her mother and three siblings. Darlin's father died when she was just nine years old. In school, she was a quiet girl, often bullied because she did not have a father.

But Darlin is no longer a shy young girl. Now, she is able to stand at a podium and advocate for girls' rights. She plays an active role empowering youth in her community, helping other girls achieve their goals.

Lack of Opportunity

Darlin suffered bullying at school due to the loss of her father and because of her religious beliefs. As a result, she was very shy and afraid to speak up for her rights. After finishing high school, Darlin wasn't financially able to continue her studies. Life as a young woman is a challenge for girls in Darlin's community because of the lack of job and academic opportunities. In fact, 24% of young women marry or take on manual labour after high school. Darlin was not able to continue her studies because she supports her family economically by working in the fields.

Quiet Leadership

Darlin was invited to a Plan International training session. Shy at first, she gained confidence with each meeting. Eventually, Darlin and the other girls developed the ability to express and contribute their ideas.

Darlin's role in the community is no longer the same. She and her peers are leaders. In fact, they've led two "We Believe in Girls" forums in which they've represented the youth of the entire municipality.

Darlin now sees a different future: One where there is space for a quiet girl to speak her mind—and be heard.

CLIMATE CHANGE ADAPTATION




Santa Barbara is strongly affected by climate changes and was especially impacted by the 2020 hurricanes Eta and lota. These storms caused a devastating infrastructure problem, destroying roads, crops, and homes.

It was vital to assist families who had lost their homes as a result of the floods caused by the storms. Humanitarian outreach provided housing with hygienic services, including bathrooms and water storage tanks. The installation of home gardens empowered families with access to healthy, nutritious food.

More than 200 children from the affected communities are guaranteed to attend school, as many lost all their educational materials during the storms. In addition, 510 children learned about risk management through community talks developed especially for youth. Adults learned about risk reduction, violence prevention and communication, with a special emphasis on gender roles.

INVESTING IN EDUCATION





As a result, 1,128 students benefitted from new or improved educational facilities. These improvements give children access to healthy and hygienic facilities, helping them feel safe when using the restroom. The project constructed separate restrooms for girls, with sanitary pads in the restroom to prevent girls from missing school during their menstrual periods.

Students also participated in training sessions on topics, such as self-esteem and communication, and 70 parents and teachers learned about violence prevention.

- 5,956 children learned about COVID-19 prevention and received hygiene kits to prevent contagion. This year, we will promote the vaccine, especially for children.
