CASE STORY: RETURNING TO SCHOOL

"I can now continue my education and pursue my dreams. My parents are not worried about having to afford school equipment, and my younger siblings can follow in my footsteps. I've rejoined the school dancing group and can perform traditional dances with my school friends."

Meet Mira

Like your sponsored child, Mira has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Mira comes from a large family – she is the seventh of nine children! Her five older siblings all dropped out of school to get married. Mira dropped out too, because her family couldn't afford the school fees. But she always wanted to continue her education.

Overcoming Barriers

Mira used to take part in school competitions, and she would do really well. As she got older, her school had mandatory computer lessons and an exam that had to be passed before she could move to the next grade.

For Mira's parents, a laptop was a luxury item they could not afford. And during the pandemic, Mira was needed at home to help her family with household chores.

To help Mira return to school, Plan International worked with her school and the local government to provide laptops and computers for all students to use.

Dreaming Big

Now that Mira can use the school computer, she is quickly catching up on her lessons and is thriving at school. She has rejoined her school dance group and is excited to forge a path forward for her younger siblings.

More than 80 other children in Mira's community also dropped out of school. Back to school campaigns are raising awareness among families on the importance of education for their children.

Financial support and extra lessons are helping girls and boys return to the classroom and open the door to a brighter future.

OUR PROJECTS IN LEMBATA ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



BUILDING DISASTER RESILIENCE



Lembata has four active volcanoes and has experienced devastating cyclones. Communities have limited knowledge of how to prepare for natural disasters, which leaves children and families at risk.

In eight communities, 200 families took part in disaster preparedness sessions. They learned about hazards in their region, how to reduce their risks, and have developed plans to respond and keep themselves safe.

528 students at five schools also learned how to prepare for disasters through games and storytelling. Children practiced using walkie-talkies to communicate risks and share that they were in a safe location.

After completing disaster preparedness training, 59 youth group members are now sharing their knowledge through home visits, helping families create evacuation plans.

KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE

There were 53 reported cases of sexual and physical violence against children last year. Violence and abuse can have long-lasting impacts, preventing girls and boys from reaching their full potential.

To help keep children safe, 21 community leaders completed training on children's rights and child protection. These leaders have now held workshops in their communities, helping 432 children learn how to identify different forms of abuse and where to go to for help.



130 mothers also took part in parenting sessions, where they improved their knowledge of child protection and wellbeing. Families can now keep their daughters and sons safe from harm and give them the best possible start in life.

- -Malnutrition rates remain high in Lembata. We will support communities in establishing childhood nutrition programmes to help children grow up healthy and strong.
- -More than 130 children have dropped out of school. We will collaborate with education departments to establish non-formal schooling to help children start learning again.
- -Girls and boys lack knowledge about their bodies. We will increase access to sexual and reproductive health education and empower girls to hygienically manage their menstruation without stigma or shame.
- -26 villages are at risk of serious natural disasters. We will work with communities and families to build disaster preparedness plans so people can stay safe.
