Thanks to your sponsorship, children and families are making positive changes in Bomi. Learn more about the valuable ways your support has benefitted them.



Meet Ma Watta

Like your sponsored child, Ma Watta has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Ma Watta is a former sponsored child, living with her family in Liberia. Her father has three wives, and each wife is responsible for caring for her children with some support from the father for school fees and food. The family's main occupation is farming.

Ma Watta attended a primary school built and sponsored by Plan International. Now, she serves as an advocate for the school's Girls Club.

Barriers to Education

Accessing education has not been easy for girls like Ma Watta. Gender discrimination means that boys are given the preference for education, while girls stay at home. As a result, girls are often illiterate, and experience low selfesteem and social intimidation. Many girls are obliged to marry at an early age.

Ma Watta was lucky. She thanks Plan for the community outreach on girls' education, remembering how her parents, as a result, enrolled her in school. "Today, I am one of the persons that have really benefited from Plan International Liberia," she declares.

Creating Change

Plan International works in 68 sponsorship communities in Lofa. Together with government agencies such as the Ministry of Education, we're creating awareness, training teachers and, supporting communities. Parents also become part of the change, and now more girls are earning their high school diploma. In fact, the number of girls in secondary school has increased to 85%. "In our girls' club meetings, I have learned the importance of a girl being educated. It is very shameful to appear in public and you are unable to write or speak fluently. I am grateful to Plan International for their tireless supports to female education in Liberia."

SUPPORTING GIRLS IN BOMI



This year, the Bomi community advocated for sexual and reproductive health and rights, and gender equality. The community project focuses on reducing sexual and genderbased violence, and advocates for girls' sexual and reproductive health rights. As a result, 80 adolescents from 16 Girls and Boys Clubs participated in workshops, learning about menstrual hygiene management, domestic violence, child marriage, and sexual and reproductive health.

In addition, 80 duty bearers were trained to set up reforms and local laws that prevent domestic violence, transactional sex, rape, child marriage, and Female Genital Mutilation (FGM). They will also support existing Girls and Boys clubs in their respective communities by creating awareness with other local authorities. Boys and men acted as agents of change, helping respond to gender- and health-based issues and advocating for the prevention of sexual and gender-based violence, FGM, and child abuse.

SKILLS TO SUCCEED





Economic independence for young women is a pathway to gender equality. This year, key programmes helped empower women and support them in the community.

As a result, 51 young women were trained in Village Savings and Loan (VSLA) activities, helping them establish incomegenerating activities. In addition, 180 VSLA members participated in a week-long leadership training course to enhance the saving activities at various community levels.

Through the Adolescent Girls Empowerment project, men learned how to give women space for their voices to be heard. Now these men encourage women to participate in decisionmaking in their homes, communities, and villages. The men act as agents of change, helping to create a more gender-equal world.

"Since I joined the VSLA in my community, I have been able to help provide the basic needs for my family, pay fees for medication, school, and food, especially as a widow I was able to construct my own house.
