CASE STORY: AN AGENT OF CHANGE AGAINST VIOLENCE



NAME: BRENDY

"I would like girls and adolescents not to be left behind and, above all, not to remain silent in the face of any situation of violence, whether physical, psychological or even within their families."

Meet Brendy

Like the child you sponsor, Brendy has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Thanks to her participation in the Empowered Girls programme, promoted by the Project for Protection Against All Kinds of Violence, she understands the important role everyone must play to eradicate gender-based violence in her community.

Effects of sexism in the community

During 2021 alone, the Peruvian Ministry of Women reported more than 163,000 cases of violence, where psychological, physical, and sexual violence stand out among the most normalised forms.

The high levels of sexism and misogyny within the community are also reflected in the division of domestic labour, with data from The National Statistics Institute's indicating that women dedicate 23 hours more than men to unpaid domestic work. This work includes both housework, as well as caring for children or the elderly.

These harmful attitudes and the stereotypes accompanying them limit the opportunities available to girls like Brendy from a young age.

Standing up for her rights

Brendy attends the workshops of the Empowered Girls programme every Monday, to learn to recognise violence in all its forms, breakdown sexist stereotypes, and work with other children her age on projects to promote change within their community.

They created posters aimed at educating other young girls about their rights, how to recognise situations of violence, and where to find support and resources.

Brendy also shares what she learns with her family and classmates, so that more people can prevent and report violence in all its forms.

OUR PROJECTS IN PIURA ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



120 officials have also received specific gender-focused training, to enable them to provide sensitive and appropriate protection services and support to victims of violence and abuse.





PROTECTION AGAINST VIOLENCE



In Piura, 8 out of 10 victims of human trafficking are women and out of them, 6 are underage. One of the contributing factors to the high rates of human trafficking within the region is the weakness of the child protection system. Public officials have limited training in areas of children's rights and gender-based violence, and victims often mistrust the public protection system.

Through this project, Plan aims to strengthen the public protection system, and provide better support both to officials and victims. So far, 211 officials have been trained in the areas of children's rights, digital skills, and use of an app which is used to report and manage cases within the protection system.

The programme has also worked with teachers, parents, and children, to ensure that all members of the community are aware of the services available and are confident in accessing support should they require it.

YOUTH ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT



Only 3 out of 100 young people in Piura have access to a good job. One of the factors limiting access to sources of formal employment for young people is the low level of education they have - less than 10% of young people complete technical education or university.

This project seeks to provide teenagers and young people, especially young women, with the training and resources needed to exercise their economic autonomy. Activities also include training teachers, orientation and education programmes with parents to encourage them to support their children's employment ambitions, and advocating with local governments to allocate funds to promote youth employment.

- Youth employment levels remain low in Piura. Plan will continue to develop entrepreneurial skills and opportunities for young people, with an emphasis on young women.
