Meet Aicha

Like your sponsored child, Aicha has been empowered by Plan International to change her life. Aicha is studying at the technical training centre, and is realising her dream to work in manual arts. With the right supports, Aicha's disability is no longer a barrier to reaching her full potential.

Overcoming Roadblocks

For children like Aicha, a lack of accessible infrastructure prevents young people from continuing their education. Aicha's school was far from home, and her mother and aunt used to carry her to and from her lessons. But as Aicha got older and bigger, this was no longer possible, and she had to drop out of school.

Aicha then struggled to support herself and help out her family as a young adult. One day, she heard about a new program organised by Plan International supporting vocational training for youth with disabilities.

Embracing this opportunity, Aicha decided to follow her artistic and creative passions by focusing on manual arts at a technical training centre.

A Beautiful Future

With transportation support, Aicha and other youth are able to travel to the technical training centre to continue their education and improve their skills.

Aicha now spends her time recycling objects to make practical, beautiful, and reusable items. She is earning an income through selling her pieces and can help support her family.

She is also gaining confidence and independence, and is hopeful of a bright and beautiful future ahead.

OUR PROJECTS IN LOUGA ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



EARLY EDUCATION



Less than 20% of young children in Louga are enrolled in pre-school. Early education is crucial for children to develop strong cognitive, emotional, and physical skills.

In 11 communities, 160 playgroups have been established and supported with learning and playing materials. More than 4,000 young children can now attend these playgroups and begin their path of lifelong learning.

And 160 mothers completed training on early childhood development and health. As playgroup volunteers, these women ensure that young children are healthy and happy while they learn and play in a safe environment. Volunteers also help to manage the playgroup, helping to keep it running for years to come.

Awareness raising sessions with local government and community leaders are also ensuring future investments in early education.





Tuberculosis is a serious health risk in Louga, which can cause lifelong damage or death if not treated properly. Spread through the air, tuberculosis usually affects the lungs. Children, the elderly, and others with weakened immune systems are most at risk of an infection.

Through awareness events, 7,126 people improved their knowledge on how to prevent and treat tuberculosis. More than 13,100 home visits also helped to identify and refer 1,501 people, including 206 children, with chronic coughs to local health centres for testing and treatment. And community volunteers also accompanied patients to their treatments, providing support and encouragement at a difficult time. Ensuring tuberculosis treatments are completed is crucial to reducing drug-resistant infections.



"I support the fight against tuberculosis. We do home visits to inform people. If we meet someone with a cough, we refer them to the health centre, and accompany them as well. Tuberculosis used to be a shameful disease, but now, people receive treatment."
