Central Zambia is home to 1.8 million people. This rural area is heavily dependent on agriculture and has been collaborating with Plan International since 2001.

This year, in partnership with UNICEF, Plan International set out to address the twin crises of malnutrition and climate change through offering vocational training in sustainable agriculture to 431 residents. 120 locals participated in awareness meetings to discuss sexual health, gender inequality, and putting an end to child marriage.

#### **Meet Wisdom**

Like your sponsored child, Wisdom has been empowered by Plan International to change his life. An illness in infancy left Wisdom with severe physical disabilities. Plan International intervened to support Wisdom and his family on their way to a new beginning.

#### No One Left Behind

When Wisdom was just five months old, he contracted a severe illness that left him hospitalised. Just over ten years later, young Wisdom had virtually no mobility if unassisted – until Plan International stepped in.

Meeting Wisdom's needs proved near impossible for his mother. Unable to move on his own, he could not enrol in school. This meant that Wisdom would sometimes be left at home, unattended, for long periods of time. On the cusp of his adolescence, Wisdom found himself lonely and isolated, while his mother struggled to stretch their money as far as it could go.

Children with disabilities are often excluded from accessing education. Our efforts with Wisdom and his family addressed ameliorating the financial, physical, and educational aspects of their situation.

#### A Path Back To Education

When Wisdom became a sponsored child of Plan International, he received a standing frame from Beit Cure hospital. Now, Wisdom is slowly beginning to walk.

Plan International also supported Wisdom and his family in connecting with an Early Childhood Development Centre. A specially trained teacher tutors Wisdom at home three times a week and sometimes even brings new friends by to visit.

We also supported Wisdom's mother, Lucy, by providing her with vocational training. Her small business now helps make ends meet.

### **BREAKING DOWN TABOOS**



175 community members participated in awareness meetings and training sessions about sexual health. In Central Zambia, young people have a limited voice in their communities and cannot speak up about their rights. With prevalent social stigma around sexuality and reproduction, young people struggle to access quality sexual health care.

This year, Plan International collaborated with 175 parents, young adults, adolescents, and children in judgment-free awareness sessions around sexual health. Local volunteers collaborated with sexual health care workers to distribute 6,480 condoms to residents.

To keep the conversation going, Plan helped form 26 Comprehensive Sexuality Education clubs in 4 districts. 100 children's clubs learned about online harassment and safety, while 75 parents met to discuss the safety of their children.

Hundreds of farmers in Central Zambia are now practising climate-adaptive agriculture for a sustainable future.





Zambia is vulnerable to the effects of climate change, which could have dire consequences for the agriculture-dependent country. As the people of Zambia struggle with droughts, floods, and dry spells, deforestation and coal production continue to be practised in the region.

431 residents of Central Zambia, including 301 women, received vocational training in livestock and climate-adaptive agriculture. These lessons will make their income more resilient to climate crises and will indirectly support the needs of 114 sponsored children.



30 local leaders learned about sustainable agriculture and passed these teachings on to another 300 farmers. 2,508 people participated in activities about natural resource management.
