Meet Verónica

Like the child you sponsor, Verónica is taking steps towards achieving her goals and building a stronger future for herself. She is a charismatic young woman interested in a variety of activities, from dance to cooking to academics. Now, as a leader in her community, Verónica has become a role model for other girls and young women.

A Cycle of Inspiring Young Leaders

Verónica's mother died when she was small, leaving her and her siblings in the care of her hard-working father. Her family's livelihood comes from agriculture in a rural area, and Verónica has worked since she was young to pay for her studies and activities.

At age eleven, Verónica was inspired by the energetic and creative teenagers she met through a Plan International school visit. These young leaders motivated her, and she became an enthusiastic participant in Plan leadership programmes. In the following six years, her engagement has been life-changing: She's now studying psychology at a top university, with support from a scholarship she earned through a Girls Take Over event.

On the Path to Success

At the Take Over event, Verónica impressed the audience with a powerful speech where she shared the challenges that young women in rural areas face in order to access a university education. Winning the scholarship as a result opened an opportunity that she describes as "once in a lifetime."

Now at school in the city, Verónica is focusing on her studies and achieving her dreams – and she is still engaged with Plan, acting as a leader to inspire the next generation of girls. She says: "For me it is a fundamental part of my life."

OUR PROJECTS IN VILLA ADELA ARE HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE



Young leaders are creating real change in their communities through political advocacy and leadership.





It is vital that young people, especially young women, are empowered with skills, resources and opportunities to advocate for their rights.

The Enfocate project empowers youth in Villa Adela with information and resources to advocate for gender equality and to bring an end to gender-based violence. Through the programme, youth develop life skills as they advocate for change in their community. This year, the programme welcomed new members and trained 46 adolescent leaders on political engagement and leadership. In addition, 43 health personnel and 6 health centres are supporting gender rights with training and certification.

As a result of the community's initiatives, new laws and directives are helping to address violence prevention, while agreements with state institutions are creating a brighter future for gender equality in Villa Adela.




EMPOWERING HEALTHCARE RIGHTS



In Bolivia, many young people lack knowledge and resources to manage their sexual health. The ARRIBA Project supports adolescents with the information, resources and skills to exercise their sexual and reproductive rights. This year, 263 adolescents and young people learned about their sexual and reproductive health and rights.

In addition, 79 women learned about family planning, birth spacing, gender-based violence prevention, and sexual and reproductive rights.

- Only 32% four-year-olds have access to early learning.
 We will continue to promote early childhood education and playful methodologies that allow parents to be included in positive parenting and early stimulation.
- Rates of youth unemployment in Bolivia are high and continue to grow. To help, we will improve the development of skills and leadership with young entrepreneurs in our community.
- Many people lack information and resources on sexual and reproductive health and rights. We will work to minimise gender gaps, ensuring that adolescents and young women have access to information.
