Positive changes are happening in Bohicon. Learn more about how we're supporting children and girls' rights through our collaborative, equality-driven work.

For example, the Plan for Girls programme engaged girls and young women to learn about and promote gender equality and girls' rights. This long-standing project continues to make an impact in the community, as participants organise awareness sessions and develop advocacy plans.

In addition, pupils are establishing school governments and parliaments to make improvements in their education—especially for girls and young women. As a result, more students are staying in school and succeeding. Vocational training and support are also making a difference: 261 girls trained in income-generating activities, with 30 young people learning solar energy and installation in Bohicon.

Meet Carole

Like many women in Benin, Carole is making steps towards achieving her goals and building a stronger future for herself and her family.

Carole left school when she had her first child at age 20. In her community, many young women leave school or apprenticeships because of early pregnancies. Without education or incomegenerating work, however, these women become economically dependent on their families.

Challenging Gender Expectations

Carole joined one of the 60 Youth Saving and Loans Association (YSLA) groups set up by the project Plan for Girls. These groups enable adolescents and young people to save money and take out loans. Carole took out a loan to develop her small business—after repaying the loan, she took out another one and expanded.

The group inspired Carole to see a future of economic independence. "I said, if other women like me can have a job and become respected people, then so can I, even if I'm a stay-at-home mom."

Empowering the Next Generation

Now, Carole is a member of the Girls' Advisory Committee, where she represents her peers and helps to amplify their voices. Along with other women from the project, she helps identify the challenges facing adolescent girls and young women concerning economic empowerment.

Carole's hope is for more young women to benefit from the same opportunities—and as a community leader, she is committed to helping the girls in her village become financially independent and invest in their futures.

Projects That Support Lasting Change

Plan for Girls

Girls in Bohicon are advocating for their right to decide, plan and lead.

Only 30% of young women who are married or in union have a say in decision-making on issues related to their health, education, work and family planning.

Through the Plan for Girls project, girls and young women are learning about gender equality and rights, empowering them with the resources to advocate for equality. Participant Sabine says, "Thanks to these actions, we now know how to defend our rights as well as our duties."

For example, 60 Youth Village Savings and Loan groups were established, engaging 1,436 young people for economic empowerment. Parents and traditional leaders participated in awareness sessions on girls' rights, and local government's capacity to address girls' rights is improving, too.

Educational Empowerment

Student-led school governments foster pupils' participation and success.

Engaging youth, particularly girls, in the management of school affairs, is transformative—empowering students academically, and providing life and leadership skills. Girls' and boys' clubs are conducting sessions with female mentors on sexual and reproductive health, and parent-child dialogues are creating awareness of children's rights.

This year, 276 school governments were established in schools, and 17 advocacy sessions were organised for secure school environments. More than 800 intergenerational dialogue sessions were organised. In addition, new classrooms and school kitchens have been built, and pupils are learning marketable skills and accessing materials and equipment to succeed.
