# Homa Bay Kenya

Positive changes are happening in Homa Bay. Learn more about how we are supporting children and girls' rights through our collaborative, equality-driven work.

A national survey shows Kenya is making steady progress in reducing gender-based violence. In Homa Bay County, communities are working to address this issue by forming children's rights clubs, safe spaces, and peer-learning groups to protect and support their children. We collaborate with various stakeholders, from local communities to the national government, to advocate for sustainable, long-term change and development.

Climate change is impacting the region's economic development. Through education and awareness initiatives, communities are adopting climateresilient farming techniques to boost yields and meet basic needs. Skill development and training opportunities are helping young people access employment, contributing to the local economy's growth.

# **Supporting Education Through Nutrition**

NAME: **Tina** AGE: **10 years old** DREAMS TO BE: **An engineer** 

> "I am focused on achieving my dreams. I can make healthy choices due to Plan's training in the school meal programme."

#### **Meet Tina**

Like many girls in Kenya, Tina is optimistic about achieving her goals and building a strong future.

After her parents separated, Tina and her elder brothers went to live with their grandmother. The majority of Tina's community relies on agriculture for sustenance. However, her village has been experiencing prolonged droughts leading to poor crop production, affecting nutrition and health of children and their family members. Threatened by this climate crisis, Tina's school couldn't sustain their free school meal programme. The nutritional wellbeing of the children was affected, leading to weak academic performance and a high drop-out rate.

#### Food for All

Last year, among five other schools in the region, Tina's school benefitted from Plan International's school meal programme. With the introduction of smart agriculture techniques, water harvesting, and solar-powered pumping technology, the school started producing vegetables to supplement their programme. Like her peers, Tina too developed skills on kitchen gardening through workshops and skill training.

#### From School to Home

Tina applied her new farming skills at home, starting a kitchen garden with her family's support. The garden's production is improving, providing nutritious vegetables and generating extra income by selling excess produce. This programme has improved food security for many other families like Tina's. Her school expanded their farm, selling excess produce to fund school supplies, supporting students' education. School drop-out rates have reduced, as children now have access to meals, enhancing their learning and growth.

## **Safer Together**

# Vulnerable groups in Homa Bay face more exclusion and violence than in the rest of the country.

Last year, our Girls' Takeover event empowered 19 young girls by providing leadership opportunities and involving them in influential roles within the county. They addressed issues such as school fee support, the provision of sanitary pads, and strengthening their participation in decisionmaking.

Furthermore, Plan International supported 188 secondary school students with scholarships. We also provided 38 children with disabilities with corrective and mobility assistance devices. Additionally, we sensitised 283 community members on inclusive education for children with disabilities, so they can interact and socialise meaningfully with their peers. Our intersectional approach makes equitable access to education possible for every child.

## Improving families' livelihood

34% is the poverty rate in Homa Bay, with almost 23% of the population facing food insecurity.

To tackle this crisis and ensure that families have the capacity to take care of their basic needs, this project empowers the youth with training in income-generating activities and entrepreneurial skills. 116 participants gained skills in product development and marketing so they could develop practical business plans. We also raised awareness among the local youth about Kenyan national funds that could support their businesses. Moreover, 62 young people were supported financially so they could take courses ranging from dressmaking to engineering.

Cash transfers have supported 636 households. By investing the money in income-generating assets, these families are now able to better take care of their children's education and nutrition.
