In addition, the REAL Fathers project empowered young men to take active, positive roles as fathers. By investing in nurturing and protective care, families improve the safety, well-being and development of their children.

Education Changes A Young Life

Meet Elias

Like many children in Rwanda, Elias was faced with economic challenges in his pursuit of an education.

Elias is a year four student who lives with his father, mother and three sisters in Gatsibo. They live near the main road and he is proud that in the future, his village will become a trading centre. His favourite hobby is football, which he loves to play during school breaks and on weekends.

The Impact of Economic Resources

Elias' goal was to study and become a teacher – but without an education, his possibilities for the future are limited.

Elias' family depends entirely on agriculture. His father has a disability and his mother works hard to provide for the family.

When Elias was in year three, he fell sick and spent time in the hospital. When he recovered, he looked forward to returning to school – yet his family was unable to afford it. Elias was despondent at the thought of leaving school and says he almost gave up hope.

The Power of Education

"On the first day the schools were opening, I was surprised to see one of Plan's volunteers calling me to go and get scholastic materials," says Elias. "I almost jumped up for happiness."

Exercise books are one necessity for students – a place to study, rest and play is another. With building materials like iron sheets and nails, Elias' family was able to improve their home. "Now I can do my homework and sleep well," he says. "When it rains, I have no fear that our house can be affected by a water leakage from the roof."

Projects That Support Lasting Change

Tools to Support Parents

Fathers get REAL

The REAL (Responsible, Engaged and Loving) Fathers project empowers young men with the skills to form positive, non-violent relationships with their families. This initiative helps promote nurturing and protective family care and improves the safety, well-being and development of children.

Young fathers participate in Early Childhood Development, child protection, and youth economic empowerment programmes. The main activities address parenting issues such as play and communication, use of non-violent discipline and responsive caregiving.

28-year-old Damien enrolled in the REAL Fathers program in 2023. He says he gained vital skills to engage with his family, and that the project inspired him to join a Village Savings and Loan Association, through which he started a business that now generates income.

The Future is Green

"Agri-preneurship" is empowering young people in Gatsibo with climate-smart agricultural employment.

"The Future is Green"-project fosters entrepreneurship, financial inclusion, and environmental stewardship for youth, especially young women. As a result, 80 youth have started their businesses. In addition, 83 youth gained access to financial services, and 71 youth-led businesses benefited from market linkage services.

Through sustainable employment and entrepreneurship, young people gain skills and opportunities, enhancing their skills and improving their resilience towards economic and climate shocks. Young people gained technical knowledge and skills on climate-smart agricultural as well as entrepreneurial know-how. Access to equipment, agricultural inputs (seeds, fertilisers), financing and technologies, plus digital innovations such as renewable energy, provided a foundation for youth to succeed.
