
# Nyaruguru Rwanda

Positive changes are happening in Nyaruguru. Learn more about how we're supporting children and girls' rights through our collaborative, equality-driven work.

This past year, key projects fostered skills and strengthened resources so young people and families can plan for a brighter future.

For example, the REAL Fathers project empowers young men to take active, positive roles as parents. With community support, families invest in nurturing and protective care, and improve the safety, well-being and development of their children.

Another project focused on providing knowledge and resources on sexual and reproductive rights to young people in over 50 villages in Nyaruguru. With access to information on health, rights and discrimination, thousands of young women and men are developing leadership skills and forming healthy relationships based in equality.

# **Education Changes A Young Life**

### **Meet Elias**

Like many children in Rwanda, Elias was faced with economic challenges in his pursuit of an education.

Elias is a year four student who lives with his father, mother and three sisters in Gatsibo. They live near the main road and he is proud that in the future, his village will become a trading centre. His favourite hobby is football, which he loves to play during school breaks and on weekends.

### The Impact of Economic Resources

Elias' goal was to study and become a teacher-but without an education, his plans for the future are limited.

Elias' family depends entirely on agriculture. His father has a disability and his mother works hard to provide for the family.

When Elias was in year three, he fell sick and spent time in the hospital. When he recovered, he looked forward to returning to school - yet his family was unable to afford it. Elias was despondent at the thought of leaving school and says he almost gave up hope.

### The Power of Education

"On the first day the schools were opening, I was surprised to see one of Plan volunteers calling me to go and get scholastic materials," says Elias. "I almost jumped up for happiness."

Exercise books are one necessity for students – a place to study, rest and play is another. With building materials like iron sheets and nails, Elias' family was able to improve their home. "Now I can do my homework and sleep well," he says. "When it rains, I have no fear that our house can be affected by a water leakage from the roof."

### **Projects That Support Lasting Change**

### **Tools to Support Parents**

The REAL (Responsible, Engaged and Loving) Fathers project empowers men with the skills to form positive, non-violent relationships with their children.

Participants engage in ongoing activities that address child protection and early childhood development. The project addresses the root causes of gender inequality and provides men with parenting and partner communication skills.

The programme engaged local leaders and 27 Inshuti z'Umuryango (or Friends of the Family) volunteers. These mentors conducted group discussions, visited participants at home, and supported young men to create a nurturing home environment. Felix, a 28-year-old father, says, "I have undergone a significant transformation since participating in the REAL Fathers programme."

# **Adolescent Health**

Improving access to sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) empowers young people.

With knowledge and resources, young people are better able to develop healthy relationships and plan for their futures. An adolescent health project has been implemented in 54 villages in Nyaruguru— and is already changing lives.

This year, rates of early pregnancy were reduced, thanks to educated, informed peer leaders. Youth peer educators were trained on SRHR, including body development, pregnancy, sexuality, relationships, harmful practices and gender-based discrimination. In addition, 20 male Champions of Change were trained on positive masculinity. As a result, 3,000 people were reached, and have now become drivers of change within their communities.
