# Tarija Bolivia

Positive changes are happening in Tarija. Learn more about how we're supporting children and girls' rights through our collaborative, equality-driven work.

Amid Bolivia's political, economic, and environmental challenges, the Tarija community is bolstering resources for young people and families. Community-led initiatives support early childhood development for children aged 0 to 8. We also collaborate on gender-sensitive policies and programmes.

Through the Decide and Demand Your Rights programme, women are gaining agency, making informed health decisions, and breaking gender barriers. We're empowering young people with business skills to achieve financial freedom, boosting their confidence and self-esteem to shape their futures.

## Like many young girls in Bolivia, Belen faced challenge in her pursuit of education.

Belen lives in Quivincha - Betanzos with her mother, stepfather, grandparents and three younger brothers. After completing primary school, children in Belen's community must migrate to nearby cities to access secondary education. However, this pursuit is expensive, and inaccessible for many. Moreover, due to lack of local employment opportunities, many children begin working as early as age 13, taking on jobs in mining, masonry, or agriculture. Some others remain home to assist with family farming and livestock rearing.

#### The Impact of Entrepreneurial Resources

Under these precarious circumstances, Plan's project that supports feminist leadership in the Bolivian highlands aimed to empower Belen and her peers by providing access to the local market, income and resources. The initiative organised honey production skill training in their community, coupled with workshops on leadership skills, sales strategies, and digital marketing. These resources enabled young girls like Belen to participate in city fairs, sell their products, and pave the way for their futures as budding entrepreneurs.

#### The Power of Education

The local authorities took note of this success story, and collaborated with Plan to develop curriculum centered around entrepreneurial ventures as formal modules for secondary education. This has enabled many children like Belen to access secondary education without leaving their communities and families. With new aspirations for the future, Belen proudly states, women can take the same jobs as men.

## **Empowering Lives**

To empower the youth, we must build a strong network of information, services, and favourable environment!

With this project, we strengthen youth through positive practices such as feminist leadership, collective agency, positive masculinities, mentoring, and intergenerational dialogues. By changing behaviors and attitudes, we promote sexual and reproductive rights in the Tarija community.

Additionally, with local institutional support, Plan International advances favorable policy proposals to safeguard the community. Local AIDA centers provide adolescent-friendly care with training and information materials.

Cyber violence is rising globally and locally. To address this, we organise "Diálogos del Sur" meetings to raise awareness on cyber security and create safe spaces online and offline.

## **Sowing steps**

Up until a child reaches eight years of age, they need special care and attention for a holistic growth and development. In Tarija, this is a challenge. Young children often lack support for healthy development.

Indicators for early childhood care are improving in Bolivia. Our project, Sowing Steps, works in seven municipalities to enhance childcare practices. Focused on learning, community support, mental stimulation, and influencing local policies, we promote comprehensive childhood development. Implementing protection networks, promoting active fatherhood, and adding play materials to curricula have improved child care in the community.

At the institutional level, we have educated municipal authorities to support child development through favourable public policies. We also help families establish gardens for fresh food and provide nutrition information. These efforts show that it truly takes a village to raise a child.
