This past year, key projects fostered skills and strengthened resources so young people and families can plan for a brighter future.

For example, university scholarships enabled young women to access higher education that will set them on a course of economic independence.

Child protection issues were also key. As a result of the stress of the COVID-19 pandemic, adolescent girls have been at an even greater risk of violence. By establishing Child Protection Mechanisms and developing awareness of children's rights, we're supporting communities as they work toward a safer, more equitable future.

Like many children in Cotopaxi, Damaris is optimistic about achieving her goals and building a strong future.

Damaris lives in an indigenous rural community in Cotopaxi, Ecuador, with her grandparents. She is an outstanding student who is passionate about natural sciences and wants to become a doctor.

The Impact of Economic Resources

Damaris dreams of a future helping the sick in her community – but without an education, she has little chance. Her main obstacle is an economic one, as her family has few financial resources.

According to official reports, in Ecuador, lack of access to education is a persistent problem. This is especially true in rural areas like the one where Damaris lives. This situation negatively impacts children's development and places unfair limits on their hopes and dreams.

Damaris' education was at risk without the financial means to cover her school expenses, threatening her goals for the future.

The Power of Education

Damaris excels in her studies – and with her hard work and dedication, she earned a comprehensive school scholarship from Plan. This scholarship covers school expenses, including supplies, uniforms, and shoes. As she gets older, her education will help her access even more opportunities for her future.

Damaris' dedication stands out in the community. With her grandparents in mind, she says she is grateful for the help "to build a better future for me and my family."

Projects That Support Lasting Change

Education for All

In Cotopaxi, 55% of children and adolescents live in poverty.

Ecuador's economic crisis has negatively impacted the educational opportunities of young people – especially those who live in rural or indigenous communities or who come from low-income households. This has exacerbated existing barriers to education.

The scholarship project provides a financial stipend to help students attend higher education. This year, five young women are on the path to university. As they focus on their education and future careers, they will be better able to break the cycle of poverty.

The five scholarship-earners are members of the Because I Am A Girl movement, demonstrating community leadership and involvement, acting as agents of change and encouraging others to prioritise their life projects.

Protecting Children

Post-pandemic child protection measures are a concern in Cotopaxi.

Young people were at home during COVID-19 school closures, and child protection systems were not able to provide adequate response or protection for those in need.

Plan's project aims to mitigate the impact of the pandemic on the well-being and safety of youth in 20 areas and directly benefits indigenous communities and rural populations. The first step was the establishment of Community Level Child Protection Mechanisms. As a result, 144 adults completed the training and developed Child Protection plans.

Adults and children learned about children's rights through events held at the community and school level. The workshops and open days reached over 1,000 people, and 426 caregivers attended training sessions on parenting.

You're Supporting a More Equal Future



Future business leaders explored sustainable ventures in the Youth Innovation Lab.

Together, we're working to create a more just world.

In Ecuador, 23% of children under five have chronic malnutrition or stunted growth. We're supporting the prevention of chronic child malnutrition though an early childhood project especially designed to support women living in vulnerable circumstances.

Only 24.8% of Cotopaxi residents have completed high school. We will focus on reducing illiteracy rates and supporting students with educational scholarships.

Underemployment and unemployment rates are high. We will help coordinate with institutions that provide training and education so young people can more effectively access employment or entrepreneurship.
