

Quiché Guatemala

Positive changes are happening in Quiché. Learn more about how we're supporting children and girls' rights through our collaborative, equality-driven work.

This past year, we worked together with children and young people to take action, speak up and influence the decisions that matter to them. Out of 22 departments in Guatemala, Quiché records the fourth-highest teen pregnancies. To address this, we collaborated with local governmental institutions to provide young girls with information about sexual education and reproductive rights, so they can make informed decisions about their bodies and future.

The brunt of climate change makes the region vulnerable to landslides, mud flows, floods, and droughts, disrupting daily life and worsening poverty. Through our entrepreneurship program, financial support, and flexible education, we work with local youth so they can gain skills to start businesses or access the labour market.

Meet Gelen

Gelen is a young entrepreneur and is the fifth daughter out of ten. She enjoys playing soccer and wants to open her own nail salon in the future. Gelen has an entrepreneurial spirit and is optimistic about gaining financial independence to elevate her family out of poverty and as a means to make her own life decisions.

Leadership School

Like many women in Guatemala, Gelen faces various barriers to accessing education and financial freedom. Due to gender inequalities and stereotypes, some in the community deters women from accessing the resources that they have. This further confines them into limited roles prohibiting them from aspiring for further challenges or holding any decision-making powers within their families.

Through Plan International's Connection for Success initiative, Gelen saw a window of opportunity to participate in her family's loom business and contribute to its growth. Subsequently, she participated in several other training processes including Leadership School that equipped her with finances, skills and abilities to make informed decisions to grow the family business.

Economic Empowerment

Gelen received seed capital and bought an artisan loom. The new loom generated better profits and she was soon able to buy another machine. This helped her diversify her family's source of income. With her economic freedom, Gelen was able to bring technological and design innovations.

She is determined in her goals, and assured of her skills. Her economic freedom has made her postpone starting her own family. Gelen wants to open her own salon and is currently enrolled in a vocation training to be a manicurist.

Projects That Support Lasting Change

Maternal and Child

Patriarchal norms globally assign women as primary caregivers, often burdening them with sole responsibility for their children's psychological and nutritional development. This imbalance is exacerbated in regions with limited access to basic needs, hindering comprehensive child growth.

Our focus on maternal and child health aims to foster awareness of responsible parenthood. Workshops provide parents with insights into the emotional and physical needs of their children. For instance, parents and caregivers undergo training in the Loving and Sensitive Care approach, emphasising early stimulation and infant feeding techniques.

Moreover, we actively encourage fathers to engage in domestic responsibilities and foster household cooperation, thereby advancing gender equality initiatives.

Spokesperson and Youth

In Quiché, entrenched traditional gender norms confine young girls to specific societal roles.

Empowering young women - especially through leadership - enhances their self-esteem and confidence, enabling them to assume leadership roles in decision-making spaces and freely express their opinions.

By fostering community leadership and cultivating peer support, young women in Quiché gain a deeper understanding of their rights, exchange knowledge, build solidarity, and increase their influence within local institutions to initiate collective actions.

The knowledge they adapt helps them to address inequalities that affect their lives both individually and collectively.

“Many of the topics that Plan teaches us are about women's rights. It teaches what we are worth as young women, and that we must study before joining our lives in marriage.”
