Occidental Mindoro Philippines

Positive changes are happening in Occidental Mindoro. Learn more about how we are supporting children's and girls' rights through our collaborative, equality-driven work.

Plan International has been a proud partner of communities in Occidental Mindoro since 2006.

Between 2008 and 2019, there were 45 recorded tropical cyclones in Occidental Mindoro. Three major typhoons and the COVID-19 pandemic set off an economic crisis, significantly disrupted education and destroyed homes for our partners in the region.

Today, an ongoing drought has heavily impacted the region, particularly those who were already living in poverty. With your help, 13 community organisations have been formed to address risk factors. These volunteers have coordinated the distribution of solar-powered fans and drinking water containers, as well as planting climateresilient trees. 509 residents are building more financial resilience through Savings and Loans groups.

Meet Aisle

Like many girls in Occidental Mindoro, Aisle is optimistic about achieving her goals and building a strong future.

Aisle always thought of herself as shy and introverted. Though she struggled at times with feeling lonely, she assumed isolation was just her nature – until she joined Plan's Youth Peer Educators programme.

Building Confidence

When Aisle's parents left her community to work overseas, she moved in with her aunt. Though the two developed a powerful and close relationship, the home was intensely quiet, and Aisle often found herself feeling isolated. At times, unfamiliar faces or encounters with strangers would overwhelm Aisle, making her cry.

In 2023, Aisle became involved with Plan International's Youth Peer Educator (YPE) programme, which helps young people – and particularly young women like Aisle – build confidence through practising leadership skills and public speaking. That year's YPE focused on an initiative called 'Learn and Stay Protected.'

I Can Do Anything

Through YPE, Aisle and her fellow volunteers became peer educators about topics like gender-based violence, reproductive rights and child marriage. Becoming a peer educator was transformative for Aisle. 'I'm good at things I never thought I could do, like public speaking,' she tells us.

Realising this new skill set helped Aisle feel empowered to branch out. She imagines a future as a nurse, and currently works with young people who have dropped out of school.

Projects That Support Lasting Change

Knowledge Is Power

Students in Occidental Mindoro are falling behind in reading.

When we asked community members to help us figure out the cause, they identified a number of factors, including poverty, absenteeism and child seasonal labour. We also discussed the critical issue of adolescent sexual and reproductive health, including unplanned pregnancies.

The Girls Challenge Grants (GCG) programme views reading as a children's rights issue: when students become unmotivated in school, the risk of them dropping out or falling behind raises significantly. Through peer coaching and mentoring, we are working with 56 at-risk students in Occidental Mindoro between Grades 4 and 10. Today, more than a quarter of those students (26%) have shown improvement in their reading and comprehension skills. We have also organised three Girls Challenge Grants groups to act as peer educators about sexual health and rights, reaching 257 young people and 105 parents.

Breaking the Silence

There were 688 reported cases of teen pregnancy in Occidental Mindoro in 2023.

Limited information about sexual and reproductive health can have life-threatening consequences: for one example, 11 new HIV/AIDS cases were reported in a single month in early 2023. We are working with community members of all ages to break the silence around sexual health, raising awareness about issues like ensuring access to menstrual hygiene products during natural disasters, preventing sexually transmitted infections and consent.

56 local teachers and 93 young people took part in training workshops about educating community members about reproductive health and rights, reaching 681 people. The lesson plans for both teachers and peer educators are comprehensive, non-discriminatory and gender-inclusive, so that young people can make informed decisions about their bodies, partners and futures.

You're Supporting a More Equal Future

Together, we're working to create a more just world.

A recent shake-up in local school management has meant that fewer directors are trained in natural disaster preparedness. We will continue to work with local leaders to ensure that schools remain safe for all students and teachers in the event of severe weather.

14% of young children in Occidental Mindoro have stunted growth due to malnutrition. We will continue our work with local parents to share information about nutrition, touching on immunisation and breastfeeding.

We will also ensure that local health care providers have the resources to provide medical attention to families experiencing food shortages.
