Luapula Zambia

Positive changes are happening in Luapula. Learn more about how we are supporting children and girls' rights through our collaborative, equality-driven work.

Luapula is getting increasingly vulnerable to climate changes with frequent bouts of dry spells and flash floods affecting the region's crop production and infrastructure damage. Through crisis risk management, we empower the local communities to protect themselves and take better care of their children.

For example, hundreds of children now use solarpowered water filter systems in their daily lives, which to a great extent protects them from waterborne diseases. Youth are developing vocational and technical skills that are supporting them with meaningful employment and breaking the cycle of poverty. Additionally, communities are coming together to ensure that girls are completing their education and have the financial freedom to dream a better future for themselves. <image>

Meet Prisca

Like many girls in Zambia, Prisca is optimistic about achieving her goals and building a strong future.

Prisca lives with her parents and a sister. Her parents are farmers, and their income from selling vegetables supports this family of four. Prisca is currently enrolled in the seventh grade and is a school prefect.

Everyday fights

Prisca like hundreds of young girls in her community, lives a life of scarcity. Lack of access to health care, education, sanitation, and food insecurity are some of the challenges that they are confronted with in her daily life, hindering her growth and development. Trapped in this vicious cycle of poverty, young girls are married off early, which often leads in early pregnancy and puts and end to their education.

Climate crises excaberates floods, droughts andwaterb orne diseases in Prisca's school and surrounding villages. Amid these circumstances, with every passing year, Prisca's dreams of becoming a nurse started feeling a more and more far-fetched to her. For many girls in Prisca's community, dreams often remain just that - dreams.

Towards a hopeful future

Plans work in communities like Prisca's has a significant impact by addressing the essential needs of girls. Youth-friendly services at health centers are providing comprehensive sexual education so that Prisca and her peers make informed decisions about their bodies and health, resulting in a 10% reduction in teen pregnancy rates.

School provisions have improved school enrolment rate, and new borewells and water pumps provide clean water, reducing the risk of malaria and cholera outbreaks.

Projects That Support Lasting Change

Girls Back in Schools

Together with local communities, we are raising awareness about the risks and consequences of teenage pregnancy and early marriage to empower young girls to make more informed decisions about their bodies and health.

Schools are playing a crucial role by supporting young girls through re-entry policies, while communities are establishing safe spaces in schools and clinics. Local leaders and parents have participated in eight intergenerational dialogue meetings, demonstrating their commitment to combating harmful cultural norms.

To ensure young girls can achieve financial independence and make informed decisions about their futures, girls have enrolled in business management and entrepreneurship courses. Additionally, youth who complete these courses are provided with start-up grants, enabling them to seamlessly transition into financial independence.

Safe Water for All

This project aims to tackle the challenges of accessing safe water in local communities. This labour-intensive task often confines women to their homes, as they are responsible for securing this basic necessity. The introduction of solar water purification kits offers an environmentally friendly, easy-to-use, and portable solution. 1,510 children have received water purification kits. In addition, training sessions have been conducted to help communities understand how to use the kits effectively, fostering trust in the equipment and ensuring smooth implementation.

The youth have embraced this method, and are promoting hygiene, water, and sanitation practices within their communities. Moreover, workshops have empowered local women to take control of their lives and address taboos related to female hygiene. Men and young boys have also participated in sessions aimed at embracing positive masculinity and promoting gender equality.

In the coming year, we will support the youth with entrepreneurship training, and vocational skills, and spread awareness about government loans and grants for starting up their small businesses. We will also continue to empower young people to innovate food production through efficient farming techniques like improved access to irrigation systems, strengthening green education and youth engagement.

Together with the Ministry of Health, we will review frameworks on adolescent sexual and reproductive health and rights, and create interventions at various levels like schools, health facilities and communities.
