Positive changes are happening in Kassala. Learn more about how we're supporting children and girls' rights through our collaborative, equality-driven work.

Plan International has been a proud partner of communities in Kassala since 1990. We work in 11 communities in Kassala, four of which have some of the highest rates of malnutrition in the state.

Since April 2023, armed conflict in Sudan has led to widespread food insecurity and severely limited access to healthcare, which has worsened outbreaks of normally-treatable diseases like malaria, cholera and dengue fever.

This year, with your support, we have distributed 1,500 water, sanitation and hygiene kits to families in need, making consistent handwashing easier. 2,084 new mothers safely gave birth with the help of 20 midwives who had strengthened their skills with extra training.

Meet Rogaia

Like many girls in Kassala, Rogaia is defying gender inequality on her way to a brighter future.

From lessons in child safety to vocational training workshops, six-year-old Rogaia and her family are developing greater financial security, supporting empowered women and helping a determined young student pursue her dreams.

Gender Norms Keep Girls Down

In Sudan, many girls do not complete their education. Early dropouts often lead to child marriages, in which wives are expected not to work in order to take care of the home. The result is that many women in Sudan lack financial independence, which can increase a woman's vulnerability to instances of abuse.

Research has shown that a child enrolled in preschool is more likely to graduate from university and earn higher wages. Plan International has been working with families in Rogaia's community to raise awareness about the importance of early childhood education, particularly for girls, as well as the dangers of child marriage and female genital mutilation.

My Mum Is A Role Model

In addition to learning more about the importance of keeping little Rogaia in school, the student's mum and aunt were connected to Plan's vocational training workshops, where they were improved their skills in henna and cosmetics.

Today, Rogaia's mum and aunt are stepping into powerful roles as providers for their families. 'Before, art was their favourite hobby,' Rogaia tells us. 'Now, they're practising their work and helping our family at the same time.'

Projects That Support Lasting Change

We Are Resilient

Ongoing political violence threatens the health of mothers and children.

As of April 2024, more than 17 million people in Sudan were experiencing acute food insecurity due to the violence and upheavals within the country.

With your support, we have been working with communities in Kassala to make sure that families have access to nutrition, healthcare, sanitation and financial security in times of crisis. In collaboration with local and national government, we are working with at-risk children and families to distribute humanitarian cash transfers to 22,220 households.

In addition to this material aid, our partners in Kassala are working closely with sponsored families to ensure that they get the psychological support that they need, and that they have someone to speak to when they have questions or feedback.

You Can Count On Me

15% of girls in Sudan are married before their 15th birthday.

Since 2022, we have been working with community members of all ages in Kassala to empower young women, foster literacy, train teachers and facilitate critical conversations about child marriage and female genital mutilation.

To date, 750 young women have joined Village Savings & Loans groups, where they build financial independence through learning business skills and jump-starting their own small enterprises. 60 Champions of Change groups have been formed, in which 1,500 adolescents – including 750 young women – practise building leadership skills through becoming powerful activists and peer educators. In addition to producing 13 radio programmes about girls' rights, we also worked with local organisations to co-ordinate two in-person meetings about equality and gender-based violence.

You're Supporting a More Equal Future



48,194 mums in Sudan know more about family nutrition and healthcare.

Together, we're working to create a more just world.

• 151,785 students have stopped going to school due to the ongoing political conflict in Sudan. We will make accessible alternative learning environments accessible so that students can continue learning.

• 22% of students have dropped out of school entirely, limiting their job opportunities. We will offer vocational training to teens who are not in school to improve their chances of finding work.

• Many people in Sudan do not have access to healthcare. We will support healthy families by bringing health services to Sponsored communities for screenings and treatment.
