



North Kordofan Sudan

Positive changes are happening in North Kordofan. Learn more about how the rights of children and girls are supported through our shared vision of equality.

Plan International has been a proud partner of communities in North Kordofan since 2000. This region is located in central Sudan, bordered by Darfur and the White Nile River valley.

Since April 2023, political conflict in Sudan has led to widespread food insecurity and severely limited access to healthcare, which has worsened outbreaks of normally-treatable diseases like malaria, cholera and dengue fever. Many families have left their homes due to the conflict.

When families are displaced due to political conflict, many children drop out of school. With your help, we built 10 temporary learning spaces and distributed 500 school supply kits to make education more accessible to at-risk communities in North Kordofan.

Girls Can Do Anything

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Meet Rogaia

Like many girls in Kassala, Rogaia is defying gender inequality on her way to a brighter future.

From lessons in child safety to vocational training workshops, six-year-old Rogaia and her family are developing greater financial security, supporting empowered women and helping a determined young student pursue her dreams.

Gender Norms Keep Girls Down

In Sudan, many girls do not complete their education. Early dropouts often lead to child marriages, in which wives are expected not to work in order to take care of the home. The result is that many women in Sudan lack financial independence, which can increase a woman's vulnerability to instances of abuse.

Research has shown that a child enrolled in preschool is more likely to graduate from university and earn higher wages. Plan International has been working with families in Rogaia's community to raise awareness about the importance of early childhood education, particularly for girls, as well as the dangers of child marriage and female genital mutilation.

My Mum Is A Role Model

In addition to learning more about the importance of keeping little Rogaia in school, the student's mum and aunt were connected to Plan's vocational training workshops, where they were improved their skills in henna and cosmetics.

Today, Rogaia's mum and aunt are stepping into powerful roles as providers for their families. 'Before, art was their favourite hobby,' Rogaia tells us. 'Now, they're practising their work and helping our family at the same time.'

Projects That Support Lasting Change

You Can Count On Me

In North Kordofan, less than 43% of children are enrolled in pre-school.

Though North Kordofan has been spared the worst of the political violence in Sudan, communities in the region continue to face significant issues related to nutrition, education and girls' rights. 40% of young children have stunted growth due to malnutrition, and girls are frequently married off before they turn 18, posing threats to their continued education.

Plan is working with dedicated parents, teachers, school authorities and schools to make early childhood development a priority. While we are constructing temporary classrooms for accessible learning in emergencies, we are also rehabilitating 8 permanent classrooms for pre-school and primary students. 15 girls' education campaigns are underway, which includes fixing up 3 gender-inclusive latrines and installing clean water sources in 2 communities.

Knowledge Is Power

Today, an estimated 6.9 million children in Sudan are not in school due to the ongoing conflict.

And until recently, Sponsored Child Hawa, age 11, was one of them. When Hawa's home community became unsafe, she and her family had to relocate. Like many girls in Sudan, Hawa's education has taken a backseat due to gender inequality. Even before the conflict started, she had never attended a formal school before. Still, this student was determined to learn.

We have been establishing temporary learning spaces in North Kordofan to help children like Hawa continue – or even begin – their educations. Students and teachers alike now have additional school supplies, meals, uniforms and menstrual hygiene supplies. For families in particular situations of need, we have offered Emergency Multi-Purpose Vouchers to help them cover the costs of their children's basic needs.

You're Supporting a More Equal Future

Together, we're working to create a more just world.

• Between 2011 and 2021, 41,861 families were displaced in Sudan due to political violence. We will provide food and financial aid to 10,000 households in the region.

• Dropout rates in this part of Sudan can reach as high as 50%. We will distribute school supplies to 4,000 children and teachers at 20 schools to make quality learning more accessible.

• The ongoing upheavals in the country have led to a large-scale increase in violence and trauma. We will train 30 social and healthcare workers to treat and support survivors of abuse.
